THE NEW FIFA LEGAL FRAMEWORK ON FEMALE PLAYERS, COACHES AND MINORS

ABSTRACT: On 4 December 2020, the FIFA Council approved the reforms to the Regulations on the Status and Transfer of Players (RSTP) which, above all, sought to afford greater protection to female players and introduce a new regulatory framework for football coaches, previously endorsed by the FIFA Football Stakeholders Committee. On 14 December 2020, FIFA issued the circular no. 1743 notifying these changes to the RSTP and the Rules Governing the Procedures of the Players' Status Committee and the Dispute Resolution Chamber (Procedural Rules) to all member associations, confirming that they would take effect from 1 January 2021. The circular also announces a new exception for the international transfer of minors in the context of Brexit, new definitions in the RSTP and other specifications on training rewards.

The article provides an overview of all the changes and their likely impact for the football stakeholders.
